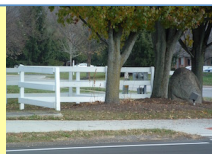

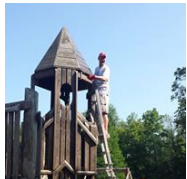

When did Granville Kiwanis sponsor the first 4th of July Celebration?
 Thanks to Dave, and his buds at the Granville Library, they found the answer in the Newark Advocate. I presume Julia Walden the reference Librarian is one of those buds.

The answer is – **1964**

The Granville council granted approval to Sheldon Kasson representing the Kiwanis Club to close Broadway from 4 am July 3rd to 8 am July 5th for the Fourth of July celebration. Sheldon Kasson reported to the club April 8, 1964 Broadway would be closed from Main St. to Prospect St. Contracts had been signed with Mickey Owens Co. for concessions, Nolan Amusement Co. for 6 rides & Maxwell Donut Co. for the donut Stand. The parade theme was “Freedom”. The schedule of events were:

July 3rd (Fri.)

12 noon – 12 midnight – Rides, concession stands, food stand, Ohio Swiss Cheese and Trail Bologna stand are open.

8:30 – 11:00 pm – Square dancing on Broadway with music by the “Five Notes” orchestra.

July 4th (Sat.)

10:45 am – Mile Long Parade with prizes awarded for the Best Organizational & Commercial floats. After the parade an address will be given by Representative Oliver P. Bolton candidate for Congressman-at-large.

2:00 – 4:00 pm – Band Concert.

4:00 pm – Children’s races and events.

6:00 – 7:00 pm – Rock and roll dance for teenagers.

7:00 – 12:00 midnight – Round & square dancing

11:00 pm – Kiwanis Club prize drawing.

Rides and concession stands will operate all day on the 4th.

The following comments taken from P. Wendell’s “On The Square” article in the Advocate. Several thousand spectators viewed the parade along Broadway. Early arrivals viewed the parade from temporary bleachers and the mid street speakers’ platform. The Newark American Legion Drum Corps headed

the parade. The Granville and Johnstown High School bands marched in the parade. Float participants included Rotary, Kiwanis, Granville Merchants Association, National Farmers Association pulled by smoke-puffing thresher tractor, Spring Valley 4-H club. Fire trucks from Granville & Alexandria. Little leagued baseball players marched. Sheriffs’ mounted posse, the Riding Club were riding in the parade. An emergency ambulance drove in the parade with a simulated “victim”.

There was an article in the Advocate about the 20-30 club meeting at the Inn with a financial report for their 4th Celebration in 1963, but no mention was made of not having another celebration in 1964. Their Gross income was \$1,300, expenses \$700, profit \$600.

COMMITTEES "a Talkin"

- **Pelotonia** - Rick Pyka reported there are 18 days until 7,758 bicyclists will be riding thru Granville on **Aug. 5th** (Sat). We will assist with traffic & pedestrian control as we have done for the last 5 years. If you will help, you need to register at <https://www.mypelotonis.org/volunteer.jsp> The riders come thru in phases starting about 9:00 am and end around 12:30 or 1:00 pm. - **Ohio District Convention Aug 11 - 13th** (Fri. - Sun.) in **Dayton** - Each club is allowed 3 delegates and there are budgeted funds of \$500 per delegate. Pres. Don said we will provide something to put in the Div. 10E basket, which will be auctioned off along with other baskets. The funds go to the Ohio District Foundation. Jen & Jess Wilson will be making a presentation at the convention. *I presume it will be about Aktion and K-Kids Clubs.*
- **Tent & Stage Rental** - Joy Williams - One World Event Coordinator for "One World: A Celebration of Multicultural Licking County" is interested in renting the stage for the event scheduled for Sept. 24th (Sun) at the Bryn Du Mansion.

- **Spiritual Aims** - Jen reported they donated \$250 to Karis' Cause 5K race Aug. 19th at Geller Park in Heath. We can have 5 participants in the race for our donation.
- **4th of July Photo Contest** - Jen reported the deadline for submittals is Monday, July 31st. The pictures will be

displayed at the Granville Library. The public will be asked to vote on the best pictures.

PROGRAM Jan Wilkin of the Heath Friendship Club. "Honor the Service: World War II" Aug. 26th (Sat)

In 4 years time the Friendship Club has been involved with 14 projects. Member's ages are within the 50 - 85 years. The Mayor of Heath asked them to be involved with the Armed Forces parade (2014 & 2015), and she was able to get a tank to drive down 30th St. with the marchers.

Last year's project involved bringing the flags of Honor to Newark at the Cherry Valley School. Eight hundred (800) flags were displayed. Two hundred ninety three (293) names were called out of soldiers that have been killed in the war on terror, as each had a flag placed with their names listed.

This year's project is to bring the World War II Memorial to the Newark-Heath Airport. We will be honoring 39 WW II veterans. Forty (40) members of the Jr. ROTC will greet them and salute the veterans. The Lancaster WW II memorial will be brought to the airport and reassembled in a 200' x 200' area on the tarmac. The memorial consists of 23 panels (each weighing 150lbs) 56 pillars, with 4,048 stars on the panels. Each star represents 100 American soldiers killed in WW II. The money to bring the memorial here has been raised. The airport runway is short, but WW II planes can land there, and they will.

Prior to 10:00 am the planes will be flying around the airport and will land at 10:00 for the 11:30 ceremony. A pilot named Speedy Gonzales has been flying WW II planes for 3 years. Jan expects to have a P51, B17, & C47 planes there. Don Jakeway parachuted out of a C47 at Normandy. Don is excited to be at the memorial. Jan hopes to have a Black Hawk and Medivac helicopters also.

People can go on a tour of the B25 and C47 planes for \$5 - \$6. At 1:30 - 2:30 a short ride can be had on the C47 for \$95. Usually it cost \$495 for a 1/2 hr. flight, 12 people fly at a time.

Dr. Bach of OU Zanesville will be writing the script for the 11:30 am ceremony at which each branch of the service will be honored individually. There will be an avenue of honor performed by the Knights of Columbus where a wreath will be carried to the memorial to honor each individual. Each of the 39 veterans name will be announced and each will be presented a 2 x 5 flag. Speakers will include Jay Hottinger and Doug Stout.

A signing interpreter team from Lancaster will be available for deaf people. There will be patriotic music and WW II era music. A food truck will be at the airport. The ceremony will be closed with taps at 6:00 pm.

Questions:

How can we help? Provide help with the security of the panels, in 3hr shifts 24 hrs a day until tear down at 12 noon Sunday.

Parking? The veterans will park at the airport-paved parking and everyone else will park in the adjoining field.
