Helping kids beat hunger

Five club members traveled to Mesa in early March to help participate in the Weekender Food Bag Project, which is organized locally through a ministry at Church of the Ascension.

Gary Oakeson, Jerry Comeau, Jim Shepherd, Phyllis Horan and Mike Scharnow carpooled with other volunteers to the head-quarters of AZ Brainfood, a non-profit organization.

The five Kiwanians helped prepare and load up more than 1,000 plastic grocery bags of food that were to be distributed to children in public schools for use over the weekend. About 50 students in Fountain Hills have been taking advantage of this program, since they use the free or reduced lunch programs during the school week but have little food at home over the weekends.

A representative from the local group had given a presentation at a Noon Kiwanis meeting, so the club followed that up with some "hands-on" volunteer labor that directly impacts children.

The Arizona Brainfood group uses a donated warehouse to assemble the food bags, making 1,000 or more food packages every school week.

The Fountain Hills contingent then delivers the food bags to local schools and teachers. Students who receive the items are personally selected by the teachers. It takes \$1,000 a month in donations to fund just the Fountain Hills portion of the program.

"It was quite an impressive operation," Scharnow said. "The program was well organized and it's amazing how quickly 1,000 bags are filled up. The volunteers were smiling and everyone pitched in some way. We need to do this more often."


It's a talented bunch. No, really.
