Christmas Trees: Help is needed for Thursday, December 26 to take down the tree stands and remove the 12 or so remaining trees. Loveridge, Daniels, Ginther, Patton and Cook are signed up.

ANNOUNCEMENTS:

Bill Glasser made a presentation proposing a joint project between SLK and the Knights of Columbus to provide a roast beef dinner on February 22 to needy families in the area. Fr. Tom of St. Henry's church has obtained major funding for the project and is looking for assistance from Kiwanis to help plan and present the dinner. It was suggested that we use the list of applicants for our holiday food projects, and also get suggestions from Consens U to know who should get invitations. We would probably need approval from the school nurses to use our list for another purpose. President Stu formed a committee composed of Bob Pasquarelli (also a member of K of C), Rose Metchick, Jim Colabelli, Linda Ellis and himself to work with the corresponding committee from K of C. They will meet at Lakeview next Monday (12/30) after the SLK meeting.



Wal-Mart contacted Bob Pasquarelli reminding us that we had not yet applied for a grant. They awarded us \$1,000.

Rose Metchick offered some information about what's going on at the Sand Lake Ambulance house. The building is being renovated including the roof and siding to correct problems with wood rot and water infiltration. There will also be a new escape stair for the second floor which will also be used for training for second floor rescues. Bonded Concrete is helping with the driveway improvements. The project is to be funded by a building mortgage and will not have tax impact. Contributions will still go toward training, not toward the building project.



Mike Gates reported that we have over \$4,000 income from citrus sales. There are still a few boxes available at \$18.00 each: 1 grapefruit, 3 tangelos, 1 navel oranges, and 2 mixed boxes. Contact Mike if you're interested. The fruit is at his house.

Pat Lane (so glad she's back and looking well!) reports that of the 87 families requesting help with food or toys, all but one have received their boxes, and the last will be picked up tomorrow. Pat says all were very thankful. It is not easy for families to ask for help. This year we again had a generous donation of toys from the Poestenkill Boy Scout troop, which also sent volunteers to help sort toys. The APHS football team also collected donations. Bob Loveridge had a conversation with a representative from the Marines Toys for Tots program to work out a better plan for next year. We often get their toys too late to use. Since we were well-supplied this year, Bob asked that the Marines pass along our toys to the Salvation Army, which was running short this year.

PROGRAM:

Eve Ward reported to us what *really* goes on at the Senior Citizens Luncheon. This project has continued for many years, having begun with just punch and cookies. Now there is a generous spread of cold cuts, breads and rolls, salads, and homemade cookies and ice cream for dessert. It is a nice opportunity for the seniors to get together and socialize. Eve appreciates donations of homemade cookies, which may be brought to the next Kiwanis meeting or to her prior to the luncheon on Thursday, January 2. This is a project that provides a lot of benefit for its relatively low expense.
