The Ohio District is excited to announce that Nancy Whetstone of the Kiwanis Club of Columbus will be the keynote speaker for the Opening Session at our Mid Year Education Day in March. An enthusiastic and dedicated Kiwanian, Nancy has had a broad variety of experiences and now spends much of her time in organizations involved with children. Her topic, "Kiwanis - the Difference is You" is sure to inspire you to look at Kiwanis in a new way.



Since 2000, she has been the executive director and CEO of the Ohio Business Week Foundation (OBW). OBW is a 19 year old statewide non-profit organization that funds, organizes and implements two week-long business education programs, which stress entrepreneurship, for high school students each summer. Under her dynamic leadership, this program has grown in quality, diversity and participation.

Nancy also serves as secretary of the Managing Board of Trustees for Hugh O'Brian Youth Leadership International, president of the Business & Industry Advisory Council for OBTA, chairperson of the Ohio Entrepreneurship Coalition, and a committee chairperson for the Kiwanis Club of Columbus. She says that in her spare time, she volunteers for Learning for Life, St. Margaret Church

and St. Vincent Family Centers; and serves as a Brownie Girl Scout troop leader.

Prior to joining Ohio Business Week, Nancy was the sole proprietor of Whetstone Consulting, a business-to-business marketing firm. She has held positions as a senior account executive for a Worthington-based marketing firm, a public affairs manager for Ohio EPA, and a public relations specialist for the American Red Cross. Early in her career, she spent three years doing outreach work, providing health care information and referrals to homeless people.

Nancy holds a BA in Journalism and Interpersonal and Public Communication from Central Michigan University. She is married and has two children.

Club Secretaries

By now I would hope that most of you will have made the switch to the KiwanisOne Online Monthly Reporting system. It is the only acceptable way for filing your club monthly reports throughout most of North America. This website portal is being given new functionality almost daily. The latest addition was to give you the capability of printing your roster (as on the Kiwanis International database) almost instantaneously. Please check it out. You will find it under the Secretary drop down list when you logon to the system.

Tax Filing Information

As most of you are aware, many Kiwanis Clubs are required to file tax returns with the Internal Revenue Service in February. If you have specific questions regarding the current filing requirements, please call the district office at the toll free number shown above. I would like to alert you that beginning with the September 30, 2008 year end, even organizations with revenues of less than \$25,000 will be required to file a new form, the 990-N. Please watch this magazine for more information in the future. We are working with our Accountant to be sure you have the most up-to-date information available.

Tuna for Turning Point

The Kiwanis Clubs of Division 11S and the Bucyrus Kiwanis Club collected 1,023 cans of tuna for the Marion Homeless Shelter and Turning Point, a facility for victims of domestic violence. The tuna, which is a great source of protein and does not require refrigeration will be distributed to needy individuals and families. The original goal for this project was 500 cans. Carol Kientz, Community Education Coordinator for Turning Point said "Not only has this been a great project for victims and their families, but it has also offered a way to raise awareness of the issue of domestic violence. I was able to visit with many clubs to describe our programs and

services. Many more people are now aware of the seriousness of this most personal of crimes." Sheila Chapman, pictured, is Facility Coordinator for Turning Point and will be responsible for distribution of the food. She said "This is a wonderful project and the Kiwanians are to be commended for their efforts. The tuna collected will go a long way to help feed families who are struggling to break free from a life of violence."

Last March we introduced a make-over of the Mid Year program as Mid Year Education Day. Our goal was to Build on the Best of the Past While Adding New Features. Based on the surveys you said you appreciated our efforts, that we made progress. Now we want to do more. So our team is working on the 2008 Mid Year Education Day, which will be Saturday March the 8th. See our website www.centralohiokieanis.org/MYED-1.htm after January 15th.

We are at the same location, the Hyatt on Capitol Square in Columbus, 75 East State St. This event will be like going to a day seminar for work. The facility is beautiful, with many opportunities to share coffee and ideas with other Kiwanians. The hotel is across the street from the Ohio Capitol Building. As a reminder, there are two Hyatt's in Columbus – so when you come to Mid Year, if you find the Hyatt and the capitol is NOT across the street, ask the kind folks in the Hyatt for directions to the other Hyatt.

What did we hear last year? You said that parts of the Mid Year needed more space – so we added space for the project posters, for lunch and for forums. You said you liked the one day time commitment – you can arrive at 8:30, the opening session starts at 9:00 with a keynote speaker and the entire program ends by 4:30.

You said you liked the format, so we will again use six themed “tracks” – each of which will have 3 – 4 different but related forums throughout the day – but at your request, we will give them more time. You can follow a track of specific interest to you – or mix and match if you want. We are again adding and revamping some forums. We think it will be stimulating and worth your while. See page six for the tentative forum list.

The project poster session last year featured poster presentations on 25 of the best club projects in the district – and was a big success! About 350 of you came, and we were overwhelmed. So we will again have this session – but in a larger venue. If you want one of your club's projects highlighted, send in the registration form in this issue by Feb. 1st.

And we will again feature all of this, including materials, forums, refreshments and lunch for one reasonable price. While you can register between Feb. 12th and March 8th, register on or before February 11th and you get a \$55 price – a \$10 discount off the full price. There are also discounts for K-Family and non-Kiwanian spouses. So register early.

Our intent is to make you feel welcome and rewarded. So put March 8th on your schedule.

M-Y Education Learning Experience (Forums)

The following shows the Tracks, the forums and a tentative session schedule:

Track 1 – Membership: Together Achieving Growth (TAG). Learn how to achieve growth through proven, positive strategies. Clubs should select a representative or team to attend all four forums. New segments are being added to last year's successful program which covers attracting new members, keeping current members, building new clubs, and diversity.

Track 2 – Service: Learn the ingredients of successful service projects and hear success stories.

No Session 1

Session 2: This session focuses on what needs to be done to have a successful service project. Project poster session winners will be available to discuss their projects in more depth.

Session 3: Learn what your KI and District Foundation can do for local clubs, includes a segment on successful grant writing techniques.

Session 4: Fund-raising – the means of acquiring resources to perform service.

Track 3 – Service Leadership Programs: Learn the joys and benefits of supporting the Sponsored Leadership Programs in Kiwanis.

Session 1: An introduction to the Kiwanis Leadership Programs. Key Leader and Aktion Clubs will be featured.

Session 2: A focus on K-Kids and Builders Club – Learn from those who have built and supported successful clubs.

Session 3: Focus on Key Club – Key Clubbers will help us understand how to relate to and support a high school Key Club.

Session 4: Focus on Circle K – Circle K members are active Kiwanians. Circle K members will discuss how all Kiwanis clubs can become involved with and support Circle K clubs.

Track 4 – Leadership and Personal Growth: Spend the day with experts who can help you learn personal leadership skills that prepare you to be a successful leader.

Session 1: Successful Goal Setting & Action Planning – We all have great goals, but that is not enough. Learn how to establish plans to achieve your goals – Remember, failing to plan is planning to fail.

Session 2: Communicating Effectively – Effective communication is important in all that you do. Learn ideas for improving your skills for speaking, writing, email, voice mail, etc.

Session 3: Managing Time Effectively & Delegation – There is never enough time for a leader to do everything. In fact, that's not the leader's job. Learn how to get things done through the efforts of the dedicated people around you.

Session 4: Running Good Meetings – Ever been to a really great meeting and wonder how it came off so effortlessly? Learn the techniques to plan and run truly great meetings.

Track 5 – Things You Might Like to Know About Kiwanis:

This is the opportunity to increase your knowledge of Kiwanis in current or future leadership roles.

Session 1: Current & Future Leaders – Learn about the expectations and responsibilities of club chairs and officers, lieutenant governors, and governors through discussion. Members considering leadership roles will benefit by hearing from those who "have been there".

Session 2: Branding and Marketing Your Kiwanis Club – Want to be able to tell both your club's and Kiwanis' story? This session will help you with useful ideas to brand your Kiwanis club in your community.

Session 3: Tools for Secretaries – Learn the newest tools available to club secretaries.

Session 4: Building A Club Website-Learn how two people built serviceable websites, not as professional website builders, but as Kiwanis members interested in opening new communication channels.

Track 6 – Special Sessions: How can we be a better Kiwanis? These forums cover a range of issues.

Session 1: Family Health Issues – This is a follow-up session to the well received forum at last year's convention – but on a broader scope.

Session 2: What are your Kiwanis issues? Come tell us what is good – or needs to change in Kiwanis. Bring your ideas.

Session 3: Pediatric Trauma – The First Lady's Project. A discussion on this wonderful project, why it is important and how Kiwanians and clubs can help its success.

Session 4: What club has enough members to do the needed service work in the community? That applies to Kiwanis, yes, but also to Lions, Rotary, Optimist and others. Learn how various clubs in the District have leveraged relationships with other groups to do more.

Directions to parking for MY Education Day: All three low-cost parking options (\$3 for the day) are approached by going south on one-way South Third Street from Broad Street. Statehouse underground parking is the first right - just across from the hotel. A right onto Damian Place will put you into City Center underground parking near the Hyatt. 15. Visit a sponsored program club meeting – they need our support

Mentioning Membership Growth three separate times in a Club Meeting could include some of the following ways or others ways that may be more specific to your Club:

1. How many Prospective New Members do we have with us today?
2. As we plan next weeks meeting, how many of you will be bringing guests to this meeting?
3. Club Membership Report on Membership Growth and plans to increase Club membership. (Membership Drive, Promotion, etc)
4. Tips for inviting guests to a Club meeting from one of your more successful Club Members or TAG Team Coaches.
5. Remind Members of your Club's specific policy concerning not charging guests for their meal at a Club Meeting.
6. Have your Division TAG Coach or Division TAG Leader be the speaker at a Club Meeting on a periodic basis.
7. Remind Club Members at the close of each meeting to please remember to invite a Guest to our next Club Meeting.
8. Make sure your Division Lt. Governor has given your Club their New Member- Sponsor Honor Roll Poster to place in your Club meeting room. This poster gives honor and recognition to your Clubs New Members and New Member Sponsors.

Send me your suggestions on different ways to mention and bring focus to Membership Growth at your Club Meetings. Our list can then be updated with your new suggestions.

As you know, all Kiwanis Members are members of our TAG Team. (Together Achieving Growth) If your Club is forgetting to mention membership at your Club meetings, please offer your assistance.

Governor Leroy Martin has designated January and February as Membership Growth Months. We welcome the challenge and leadership of our Governor. Each Division has the goal of putting together a division Together Achieving Growth (TAG) Team, building a new club, revitalizing two new clubs, and all clubs increase membership each month.

So far this year, Divisions 1N, 1S, 3, 5, 7, 11N, 11S, and 15 have selected potential sites for new clubs, put Division TAG Teams in place, and are putting plans in place with sponsoring clubs. Good work Lt. Governors and TAG Coaches.

TAG Coach Chair, Bill Pierce, and his District TAG Coaches put together an excellent Ohio Growth Summit with presentations by Kiwanis International President Elect Don Canada and K1 Club Director Earl Forbes. Lt. Governors, Division TAG Coaches, and District Officers attended the workshop on December 1st. TAG Coaches will be happy to assist your local club or division. Handouts were available for all.

Some of the topics covered were: the why in Ohio, new club building, membership growth plans, the sticky little assessment, membership recruitment meeting, recruiting role play, the elevator speech, mentoring new members, and why Kiwanis.

Several years ago, Kiwanis International had an initiative to start young children's councils throughout the world. The initiative took hold in some locations, but it seems that these coalitions have lost momentum or disintegrated over the last several years. I would like to explain what these councils are and how they impact your community by supporting Young Children: Priority One.

A young children's council is a collaborative effort between area Kiwanis clubs and local social agencies to promote programs for children under age 5 and their parents. Other members in young children's council may be librarians, teachers, health care professionals, government employees, or other individuals or group representatives from organizations that focus on the needs of young children. Young children's council members can work together to share ideas and resources to help young children, develop education, promote healthfulness, and develop parenting skills. The goal of this coalition is to further develop relationships within the community and not "reinvent the wheel."

The Division 20 Young Children's Council (YCC) is a great example of what a group of caring individuals can do. Initially, Kiwanians and other concerned individuals united to develop a Parenting Expo. The YCC planned a day long Parenting Expo that included workshops for parents to develop their skills, child care, a puppet or magic show, and lunch. In the first several years of the YCC, this was the focus for the group. Members drew upon their knowledge of the social service agencies to have informative speakers. They met monthly for exactly one hour to plan this annual event. This could be a great way for a young children's council to serve the community.

Unfortunately, the attendance at the Parenting Expo did not warrant the efforts of the group to continue planning it annually. After much discussion and trial and error, the Division 20 YCC, consisting of members of various clubs throughout the division, chose to have monthly projects division-wide to support the efforts of Young Children: Priority One. Some of the projects the group has done over the past couple of years follows.

- An annual diaper drive is held each winter to benefit local food pantries and childrens agencies. Clubs throughout the Kiwanis-Family compete to collect the most diapers.

- Comfort kits are made for the local hospital and the American Red Cross that have coloring books and small toys to help children through traumatic events.
- The YCC participates and sponsors activities in April for Pinwheels for Prevention. This is a statewide initiative to prevent child abuse. Pinwheels are "planted" in public places to signify the number of reported case of child abuse occurred in a given year.
- Collections for sweaters for clothing shelters, outdoor toys for domestic violence shelters, and school supplies for area children have occurred.
- Literary programs such as the Portage County Literacy Coalition and First Reads have been supported.
- Members of YCC have attended parenting fairs to hand out choke tubes, batteries for smoke detectors, and parenting materials from Kiwanis International.

If you are interested in starting a young children's council in your area, please feel free to contact me for more information.

Note: Some counties already have an early childhood council as part of their Family & Children First Council.

District Foundation Awards Grants

Kiwanis Clubs in Southwest Ohio have joined to present a preschool safety education program called "Safety Rocks".

The Ohio District Foundation has awarded a grant of \$1,000 to support this program which exemplifies the Foundation's focus on Pediatric Trauma Prevention. The Kiwanis Club of Delphos will receive \$2,500 for an improved playground project in their community to be dedicated on July 4, 2008.

The Kiwanis Club of Olmsted Falls has partnered with the Key Club, Builders Club, K-Kids Club and Westlake AKtion Club to construct an adaptive playground for children with disabilities in Olmsted Falls. The Aktion Club members stated "We will surprise you at what we can do. We can do a lot more than people think we can, we just need a chance to show you." With a grant of \$2,500 from the Foundation, they will get a chance to participate by spreading the mulch for this playground.

Club Advised Funds

The Ohio District Kiwanis Foundation board recently approved three new club advised funds. The clubs of Eastlake, Grafton-Midview and Port Clinton have joined 12 other clubs in using this service of the Foundation for management of their funds. Kiwanis International Club Newsletter Contest

The Kiwanis International Club Newsletter Contest has changed. The term used to designate the club publication, formerly club "bulletin," is now club "newsletter."

Districts are encouraged to continue their newsletter contests utilizing the traditional size categories. By awarding banner patches or prizes in five categories based upon club membership size or other criteria, more club editors will be encouraged to perform at the highest level in order to receive recognition in their district. But each district now also should create the new category of overall Best Club Newsletter.

PURPOSE: To stimulate the production of effective club newsletters, build morale among club editors, and improve this prime source of Kiwanis communication.

PROCEDURES: Kiwanis clubs will enter their newsletters in their district's club newsletter contest, by such a deadline that judging can be completed in time for awards to be presented at the district convention. Each district will then forward its choice of the best club newsletter in the district for entry in the International Club Newsletter Contest.

DEADLINE: Three or more representative issues of district winners will be submitted to the Kiwanis International public relations department by September 30.

JUDGING: Judging will be performed by the chairman of the International Committee for Marketing and Public Relations and a judging panel chosen by the chairman.

ANNOUNCEMENT OF WINNER: The International Contest winner will be notified in the spring prior to the International Convention 2009.

KIWANIS INTERNATIONAL CLUB BROCHURE CONTEST

The club brochure is rapidly gaining popularity and some clubs consider it to be their best member recruitment tool. The contest encourages every club to produce and make use of an effective club brochure.

Kiwanis International strongly recommends that each district create a club brochure contest with the same general procedures as the club newsletter contest. The district contests will provide the entries for the International club brochure competition.

A good club brochure is one of the best PR and membership tools that any Kiwanis club can have. Such brochures attract both public awareness and potential members.

PURPOSE: To encourage and stimulate the production of effective club brochures for public relations, marketing, and member recruitment.

PROCEDURES: Kiwanis clubs will enter their club brochure in their district's club brochure contest, by such a deadline that judging can be completed in time for awards to be presented at the district convention. Each district will then forward its choice of the best club brochure in the district for entry in the International Club Brochure Contest.

DEADLINE: The best club brochure in each district will be submitted to the Kiwanis International public relations department by September 30.

JUDGING: Judging will be performed by the chairman of the International Committee for Marketing and Public Relations and a judging panel chosen by the chairman.

ANNOUNCEMENT OF WINNER: The International Contest winner will be notified in the spring prior to the International Convention 2009.


THE OBJECTS OF KIWANIS
