Kiwanis Program - June 17, 2017

Career Starter Program

District 38 Area Vocational Programs (AVP) and Option 038

Ted Bauman introduced three former Lewis Palmer High School students who won scholarships from our Monument Hill Kiwanis Club Foundation this past year. These scholarships allowed them to participate in the Area Vocational Program (AVP) at Pikes Peak Community College. Ted explained how they were all helped in furthering their individual academic goals from these scholarships. \$9,000 in total was awarded to local District 38 students.



The first to speak was Alexa Goins. Alexa graduated from Lewis Palmer High School this past May and told us how she participated in the AVP at Pikes Peak Community College every day this past year. She studied in the Health Science Technology Program and now wants to earn a Registered Nursing degree. She's worked part time the last two years at Hope Montessori School and drove herself to PPCC every day. She says her eventual goal is to work in pediatric nursing. Many of the oldsters in the audience said she might consider geriatric nursing instead. Alexa says she learned a lot through the AVP program about self-discipline and self-motivation and looks forward to continuing her work at PPCC next year. She thanked MHKC for the \$2,000 scholarship that is helping her reach her goals.



The next scholarship winner (\$1,000) to speak was Winston Brower. He's been in the District Options Program, which supports students academically, and just graduated from LPHS this May. He came to high school from home schooling and faced significant academic challenges not knowing what he wanted to study. He's just finished a successful couple of years in the Options Program and plans on completing a two-year program at Northeastern Junior College where he will study a trade such as becoming a mechanic, electrician or welder. For Winston, college is more than a degree; it is the pursuit of knowledge, personal growth, self-discipline and the chance to experience new things regardless of his future career. Winston knows he is hard working, adventurous and can think outside the box to solve problems. He particularly likes working with his hands and has worked at a variety of jobs throughout his time in high school.



The last student we heard from was Steven Vertucci, who graduated from LPHS this May and currently has 12 credits at Pikes Peak Community College. He plans to spend the next 2 years there completing his Associates Degree in Fine Arts. He eventually hopes to pursue a PHD in music theory. Steven grew up in a musical family but has taken the long road to music, initially rejecting his introduction to guitar but after a few years, totally embracing it. Through both formal education and self-study, he's learned to master all types of music. He displayed his professional level guitar skills to us by playing two guitar solos—a classical Bach piece and Flamenco. He is an amazing talent and eventually wants to work at a major university teaching others his art.



Next on the agenda were two very talented and dedicated high school teachers introduced by Ted to explain the special programs for alternative education in both District 38 high

schools. The first was Robin Hudson who explained the Area Vocational Program that sends selected HS students to study a few hours each day at Pikes Peak Community College. They can take courses in the following areas: Automotive Collision Technology, Automotive Service Technology, Construction, Criminal Justice, Culinary Arts, Cyber Security, Diesel Power Technology, Early Childhood Education, Fire Science Technology, Interior Design, Multimedia Graphic Design, Radio & Television, Welding, and Zoo Keeping. Robin explained that next year AVP will be called Career Start. This year, the district had 25 students participating and next year, it will expand to 48. The district pays between 3-4 thousand dollars a year per AVP student to PPCC. Students can either earn certificates or work toward degrees. Robin has been at LPHS for two years.



Greg Long next explained the Options 38 program, which is a non-traditional approach to teaching sophomore to senior students and allows them to earn lost credits or recover from a slow start in high school. They continue their high school education using longer periods of instruction with far fewer teachers-a more intensive hands on approach versus the usual 7 periods of different classes every day with a variety of teachers. Options students can also participate in AVP or Career Start or take courses online to recover lost credits. Next year, the Options Program is formally going away. However, non-traditional teaching will still be done in the same way as in the past for select students who need a more intensive approach. The Options 38 techniques will be integrated into more regular classes. Also, doing away with the Options name may reduce the stigma that some people feel about that program. The district is attempting to identify students earlier in their freshman year so that these techniques will keep more students from losing credits/time. Mr. Long has been in the Options Program for 11 years and is proud of the 90% graduation rate for these students.
