## El Pomar

### Thayer and Davis Tutt

The El Pomar Foundation is one of the preeminent philanthropic organizations in Colorado. Our speakers from El Pomar were Thayer and Davis Tutt. Thayer is President and Chief Investment Officer of El Pomar and a member of the Board of Trustees, and a 5th-generation member of the Foundation.

Davis, Thayer's son, is a Fellow at El Pomar. Davis works on various activities in El Pomar, including the Internship team, the Forum for Civic Advancement, the Western Legislative Summit, and the Wildland Fire Fund. Also joining them was Matt Carpenter, who is Executive Vice President and Corporate Secretary for El Pomar Foundation. He currently oversees the grant office operations.

The Tutts gave us an overview of the history of El Pomar and the two families who started it, and a look at the current operations of the non-profit foundation. Thayer started with a look at Spencer and Julie Penrose and Charles Tutt, the founders of El Pomar.



In the 1890's, Spencer Penrose and his friend from Philadelphia, Charles Tutt, became business partners in Cripple Creek, where they profited from its mining and real estate. Proceeds from their C.O.D. mine financed milling interests in Colorado City. They then amassed an even greater fortune in Utah, where they owned the Bingham Canyon Copper Mine.

Penrose married Julie in 1906. Julie McMillan was the daughter of Alexander Lewis, prominent businessman and mayor of Detroit. Philanthropy was a key value for Julie. She became a founder of the Broadmoor Art Academy and Central City Opera. The Penroses then build the Broadmoor Hotel, the Pikes Peak Highway, Penrose House [their home], and Cheyenne Mountain Zoo.



Spencer Penrose was a visionary and entrepreneur, and his wife, a patroness of the arts and philanthropist. With their combined initial gift of \$21 million, together they established El Pomar Foundation in 1937, a living legacy that would contribute to the future of Colorado. Charles Tutt was on the Board of Trustees. The mission of the Foundation is to enhance, encourage, and promote the current and future well-being of the people of Colorado.

Davis Tutt then outlined the organization and current operations of El Pomar. Included in the many functions of the Foundation is the Awards for Excellence program, a community stewardship program to recognize top performing nonprofits. Since 1989, the Awards for Excellence program has provided \$5.8 million in grant support to over 700 nonprofit organizations throughout Colorado.

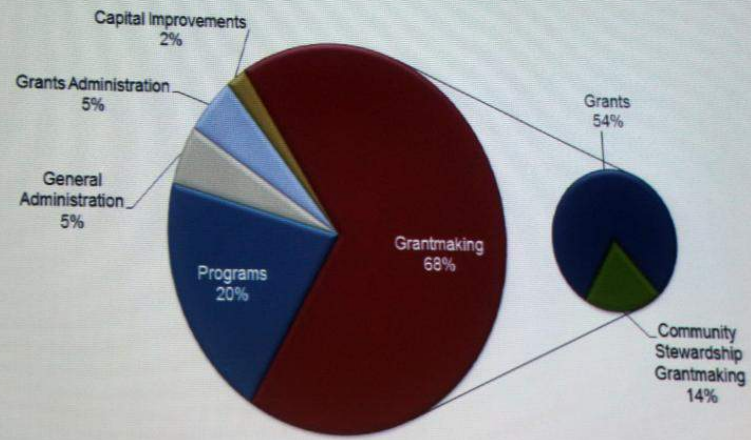
In 1991, the first Fellowship class joined El Pomar. The El Pomar Fellowship is designed to develop Colorado's next generation of leaders. Davis is a member of the current class.

In 2002, the Wildland Fire Fund was created in response to Colorado's devastating wildfire season. The fund assists with the immediate emergency needs of Colorado's volunteer fire fighting agencies and first responders.

The Regional Partnerships program was established in 2003 to broaden the Foundation's impact and support to rural communities. These examples are only a few of the functions within El Pomar.

How it Works

### Basic Criteria:

- 501(c)(3) organization or government equivalent
- Grant must support programs within Colorado

### Eligibility:

- Three year wait after a grant request is funded
- One year wait after a grant request is declined
- No capital grant requests exceeding \$100,000
